Thank you for choosing the Museum of Durham History for your classroom field experience! We would like to make sure that you and your students get the most out of your visit. This guide will help you plan and prepare for your visit.

About the Museum of Durham History

The Museum of Durham History uses stories about people, places, and things to foster curiosity, encourage further inquiry, and promote an understanding of diverse perspectives about the Durham community and its history. The museum puts its mission into action as a free, public venue that features rotating exhibits on a variety of Durham topics.

General Information

- Free parking is available next to the museum and we can accommodate most school busses.
- The museum comfortably accommodates up to 15 students and two chaperones. This allows enough room for people to move around, and look at the exhibits. Larger groups can divide into sub-groups and rotate between the museum and downtown self-guided activities.
- Our school program Durham Beginnings lasts approximately one hour and 15 minutes.
- Your group may want to eat lunch at the Five Points Plaza at the intersection of Main & E. Chapel Hill. We recommend the Five Points Plaza or any of the few parks within walking distance for a snack or lunch before or after your visit.

PLANNING YOUR VISIT

Durham Beginnings Program

Grades 3-5

Our *Durham Beginnings* elementary program uses storytelling (narrative history) and primary sources to explore Durham's early history and the people featured in our Durham Beginning's exhibit. Students take a deeper dive into Durham's History with a *Scavenger Trivia Hunt* or the *I-Spy Activity*. The program is one hour and 15 minutes and is designed for up to 15 students.

Grades 5-8

Our *Durham Beginnings* middle school program uses storytelling (narrative history) and primary source analysis to investigate Durham's early history and the people featured in our Durham Beginnings exhibit. Students create and share historical narratives. This activity which can also be extended into a post-visit activity in the classroom. The program is one hour and 15 minutes and is designed for up to 15 students.
